In the 2014 Legislative Session, the Emergency Communications Tax (9-1-1 Tax) was adjusted to include Prepaid Wireless and VOIP, with collection to commence January 1, 2015. Also the "sunset" of the tax was extended to January 1, 2022.

3. Describe how the funds collected are made available to localities.

Tax is collected each month.

Tax is remitted to Oregon Dept. of Revenue, each quarter.

Each quarter, amount collected is turned over to Oregon Emergency Management for disposition.

Up to ½ of 1% is returned to Oregon Dept. of Revenue for collection costs.

Up to 4% is used to pay for Administration of State 9-1-1 Program.

35% is placed in the Enhanced Subaccount to pay for circuiting and equipment to get the E9-1-1 call to the proper PSAP. Oregon is statewide, border to border Enhanced.

The remainder is then distributed to the governing bodies of the PSAPs on a per capita basis of the population of the PSAP's service area to help pay for PSAP operations. The 9-1-1 tax distributed covers only approximately 24% of the PSAPs operational costs. The remaining needed resources are from "local" monies.

E. Description of Uses of Collected 911/E911 Fees

1. Provide a statement identifying with specificity all activities, programs, and organizations for whose benefit your state, or political subdivision thereof, has obligated or expended funds collected for 911 or E911 purposes and how these activities, programs, and organizations support 911 and E911 services or enhancements of such services.

The State 9-1-1 Program has the authority to expend monies in the Enhanced Subaccount to pay for all costs related to the "backbone" of border to border Enhanced 9-1-1 service in the state. To include all circuits and trunking. Selective routing of all calls to the proper PSAP. Frame Relay network in which ALI and other information is transmitted to each PSAP in the state. GIS and mapping to plot the calling party's location at the PSAP. All CPE needed including PSAP call taking equipment and maintenance thereof. Everything needed to make the phone ring at the PSAP.

From that point, the costs shift to the PSAPs. The Distribution of 9-1-1 tax that is made to the PSAPs is spent by the PSAP for operations. For the majority of the PSAPs the tax only covers a portion of their personnel costs.



As the State 9-1-1 tax distributed to PSAP governing authorities is only approximately 24% of total PSAP operations, local monies are used for the remainder. It is unknown if any of these governing authorities made use of any federal monies or grant monies or special collections to cover these costs. Some of the entities use "dispatch fees" to fund operations. These are amounts that local entities pay to the PSAP governing authority to dispatch their emergency services.

Local 911 Fees There are NO local 9-1-1 fees. Only local monies are used for PSAP operations. This could be a mixture of general fund dollars by the governing authority of the PSAP or dispatch fees, or a local option levy for Public Safety, or other types.
