The state collects a monthly 25 cent fee on all cellular phones and a .05% on pre-paid cellular phones. 1% of collections goes to the Ohio Department of Taxation to fund the processes needed to handle the funds. 2% of collections goes to the Ohio 9-1-1 Program Office to coordinate state level 9-1-1 activity associated with 9-1-1 and NG 9-1-1. 97% is disbursed to the counties who can expend funds per rules in Ohio Revised Code Chapter 128.

K. Measuring Effective Utilization of 911/E911 Fees

1. Please provide an assessment of the effects achieved from the expenditure of state 911/E911 or NG911 funds, including any criteria your state or jurisdiction uses to measure the effectiveness of the use of 911/E911 fees and charges. Currently, each county in Ohio can only expend state funds for approved expenditures on four wireless PSAPs. This number will drop to three in 2018. Counties with large municipal corporations that reach a certain population threshold can expend state funds on an additional PSAP. Local funding is through general funds, tax levies, fees or sales tax measures.

The effectiveness is varied depending on the specific county. Some rural counties' entire 9-1-1 budget is from state funding, while others completely fund their operation locally and use state funds for equipment and training purchases.

Assessments of funding use will begin in 2017 for calendar year 2016. Additional compliance auditing will begin in May of 2018 in reference to PSAP Operations Rules that just became effective with a two-year compliance period.

Local responses to this survey were so varied and intricate, the format could not be used to recap local details. A spreadsheet is attached indicating local responses to questions that resulted in a wide variety of responses.
